



2. Commander's Narrative Summary of Significant Events

a. At the beginning of the reporting period LtCol W. MOORE was commanding the 1st Antitank Battalion. Company A, reinforced with two platoons from Company B, 1st Antitank Battalion, was in direct support of the Chu Lai Defense Command and the 1st Marines. Company B (-) was attached to Regimental Landing Team - 5. Company C was in direct support of the 7th Marines.

b. On 1 May, this Battalion commenced operational planning to support the 7th Marines in Operation MONTGOMERY, based on information contained in reference (a). An operational brief, "Concept of Antitank Support", was prepared and submitted to the Commanding Officer, 7th Marines to assist him in planning and coordinating Ontos support. See reference (b).

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5 June 1966

c. Liaison with the Commanding Officer, 7th Marines and Staff indicated that Ontos support for Operation MONTGOMERY would exceed the number organic to Company C, their direct support AT Company. To fill this requirement, two platoons from Company A were placed OPCON Company C for the duration of the operation. The 7th Marine Regimental Frag Order initially task organized the 1st Antitank Battalion (-) as a subordinate command for this operation.

d. Based on the guidance received from the 7th Marines, this Battalion prepared Fragmentary Order 301/1-66. However, prior to its issuance the 7th Marines published a change to their task organization, listing Company C, 1st AT Bn vice the 1st AT Bn (-). Consequently, the order was not issued. It is included in this Command Chronology as reference (c) for the information of higher headquarters.

e. Company C reinforced with two platoons from Company A, participated in Operation MONTGOMERY in direct support of the 7th Marines. See references (d), (e) and (f).

f. On 2 May, Maj J. J. KEEFE, the Battalion S-4, was transferred to the 1st Marines. 1st Lt. T. F. DEMPSEY was assigned as S-4. See references (g) and (h).

g. On 7 May, the 1st Platoon, Company B, which had been attached to BLT-1/5 since July 1965 CHOP this Battalion. The platoon was attached to Company A (Rein) pending the arrival of Headquarters, Company B from Okinawa. See reference (i).

h. On 14 May, MSgt D. W. MANIFOLD was assigned as Battalion S-1. See reference (j).

i. On 14 May, 1st Lt. J. A. LANE, the Battalion S-2, was transferred to the 3rd Amphibian Tractor Battalion. Sgt J. J. KU was assigned as S-2. See references (j) and (k).

j. During the period 20-22 May, Company C participated in Operation MORGAN in direct support of the 7th Marines. See references (d) and (l).

k. On 24 May, LtCol Walter MOORE, the Battalion Commander, was reassigned as Commanding Officer, 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines. Maj. Robert E. HARRIS, the Battalion Executive Officer, assumed command of this Battalion. Maj. A. J. EAGAN was assigned as Battalion Executive Officer, retaining the position of S-3 as an additional duty. See references (m), (n) and (o).

l. On 24 May, 1st Lt. F. S. ROE was assigned as Battalion S-2 vice Sgt KU. See reference (o).

m. During the period 24-29 May Company C participated in Operation MOBILE in direct support of the 7th Marines. A 1st Antitank Battalion reconnaissance team was attached to the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines Command Group during this operation. Its mission was to reconnoiter

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the new 1/7 sector of the 7th Marines TAOR to determine Ontos trafficability and employment in the area. See references (d), (p) and (q).

n. On 27 May, Headquarters, Company B, which had been attached to RLT-5 since 1 March 1966, CHOP this Battalion. For the first time since May 1965 this Battalion had administrative and operational control of its three organic antitank companies. Company B rejoined its two organic platoons from Company A. The 3rd Platoon, Company B is presently attached to BLT-3/5 on SLF duty. See references (r) and (2).

o. On 27 May, MSgt MANIFOLD, the Battalion S-1/Adjutant was promoted to the rank of Second Lieutenant. See reference (t).

p. On 29 May, Company A was placed in direct support of the 5th Marines. Company B was placed in direct support of the Chu Lai Defense Command by the Commanding Officer's verbal order.

q. During the reporting period units of this Battalion participated in three major operations and escorted in excess of thirty convoys outside the 1st Marine Division TAOR.

19 May 1966 Onco from the 1st and 3rd platoons participated in a Tank/Infantry rehearsal with the Reconnaissance Company, 2nd ARVN Force gung Regt.

20 May 1966 through 21 May 1966 as a company in joint Marine/ARVN combination search and destroy sweep with a Company B at the conclusion. Code name Operation "MORGAN". See the After-Action report for details.

23 May 1966 attended planning conference for Operation "PRIDE" Joint Marine/ARVN search and destroy mission.

1. MISSION. Co. C, First Antitank Battalion is attached by reference (a) to 7th Marines (-)(Rein) for Operation HUNGUIN.
2. CONCEPT. Preliminary planning indicates anticipated use of Ontos in two different missions during the operation; support of artillery elements moving with AMVH forces on D-1, and (on order) overland movement on D-day to establish a blocking position and/or provide direct fire support to infantry (see overlay). To best provide the desired support, Co. C has been reinforced with one additional AF platoon from this battalion. Additionally, the battalion will provide a liaison team to be located with Tanks and Artillery in the vicinity of the Regimental Command Post, a logistics contact team to be located at the ISA, and a reinforced rifle squad, to be located initially with the logistics team. These teams will provide their own communications between each other and the AF Bn Command Post. The following coordinating details are furnished:

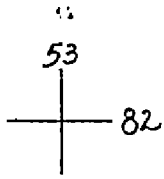

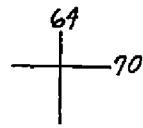

1. SITUATION.

a. Enemy forces. Annex A (Intelligence).

b. Friendly forces.

- (1) 2d ARVN Division on D-1 attacks west in assigned TAOR, clears firing positions for artillery and conducts search and destroy operations.
- (2) 7th Marines (-)(Rein) on D-Day lands in LZ's to be announced and attacks northwest in assigned TAOR.
- (3) 3/11 (-)(Rein) DS 7th Mar (-)(Rein).
- (4) 1st TK Bn (-) DS 7th Mar (-)(Rein) on D-Day attacks Southwest from Binh Sohn in Tank/Infantry/LVT column.
- (5) SLF remains off shore available for employment.



c. Attachments and detachments.

- (1) On D-day, on order, 1st Antitank Battalion (-) will be reinforced with one (1) rifle platoon and one (1) Engineer Demolition/ Mine Clearing Team.

2. MISSION.

1st Antitank Battalion DS 7th Marines (-)(Rein)

3. EXECUTION.

a. Concept of operation.

One platoon convoy and firing position security on D-2; Company Command group and two platoons DS 3/11 on D-1; Company (-)(Rein) attacks west to phase line Dog on D-day. See Annex B (Operation Overlay). Overall concept of Ontos employment is subject to change as the enemy situation develops.

b. Co C (-)(Rein)

- (1) On D-2, provide convoy and firing position security to 3/11 (-)(Rein), with one platoon.
- (2) On D-1, provide convoy security to remaining elements of 7th Mar (-)(Rein); on arrival objective area, provide DS to 3/11 (-)(Rein), with two platoons. One platoon to remain vicinity Regimental CP; one platoon to remain vicinity LSA.
- (3) On D-Day, on order, with three platoons and attachments, attack on assigned axis of advance to phase line Dog; prepare to support infantry by fire. One platoon to remain DS 3/11 (-)(Rein).
- (4) Prepare to perform other DS missions in addition to, or in lieu of those assigned.

c. Coordinating instructions.

- (1) D-Day: 8 May 1966.

- (2) All vehicles, tracked or wheeled, will be hardened with sandbags before departing the Combat Base.
  - (3) Carry deep water fording kits for all Ontos.
  - (4) Be prepared to destroy Ontos if capture is imminent; destruction will not be carried out without specific authorization from Commanding Officer, First Antitank Battalion (-).
  - (5) All personnel will be alert for anti-personnel and anti-vehicle mines.
  - (6) SITREPS will be submitted to this Headquarters at 0600, 1200, 1800 and 2400 daily. SPCTREPS as contacts occur.
  - (7) Annex B, Operation Overlay.
  - (8) Ontos will not proceed or fire beyond phase line Dog, except on authenticated order.
  - (9) Hill Nui Tran BS 515780 is occupied by friendly troops. It will not be fired upon except on authenticated order.
  - (10) Unclassified code name of Operation: MONTGOMERY.

h. ADMINISTRATION AND LOGISTICS.

a. Supply.

(1) General.

- (a) FLSG-B provides all classes of supply.
- (b) The LSA will be established in vicinity Quang Nai Airfield, coord (BS 610719) by LtCO on D-Day.
- (c) The S-4 will provide a representative in the LSA to receive organic weapons and equipment of casualties.

(2) Prescribed loads.

- (a) Class I - 4 MEC's will fuel per individual.

- (b) Class II - Combat essential as prescribed by unit commanders.
  - (c) Class III - Vehicles full, 5 gal. fuel cans mounted on vehicles.
  - (d) Class IV - As required.
  - (e) Class V - Basic Allowance.
  - (f) Water - 2 canteens per individual. Two bottles purification tablets per man. 2 five gallon cans per vehicle.
- c. Distribution.
- (1) Prescribed loads sustain units on D-Day.
  - (2) Unit distribution on D-1 using helicopters in direct support of units requesting supplies.
- d. Resupply.
- (1) Resupply will be requested through Battalion S-4.
  - (2) Requests for morning resupply will be submitted by 1930 the night before. Requests for evening resupply will be submitted by 1430 if the tactical situation permits. Normal resupply ceases at dark.
- e. Captured material.
- (1) Captured material will be evacuated to the 7th Marine CP and turned over to the Intelligence Officer.
- f. Salvage. The Battalion S-4 will be kept informed of all material requiring salvage. When practicable all such material will be returned to the LSA. No materials of potential use to the enemy will be left abandoned or unguarded.
- g. Transportation of supplies.
- (1) By truck/air from FLSG-B.

- (2) Eight (8) Helicopters will be assigned to the LSA for direct support of each Battalion.(Infantry Battalion).

h. Medical.

- (1) The Company C Corpsman will support that Company in the objective area.
- (2) Casualties who need further medical treatment will be helicopter lifted to collecting points in the objective area and will be evacuated to 1st Medical Battalion at Chu Lai.

i. Personnel.

- (1) Unit Commanders will submit a six line impression to Battalion Headquarters (original and two) of participants in the operation, prior to 1600, 4 May 1966.
- (2) Unit Commanders will provide Battalion (forward) with any changes in personnel status prior to 0645 daily (report will cover period 0600-0559 daily).
- (3) In the event of casualties, Unit Commanders will inform Battalion S-1 immediately by the most expeditious means of all the facts.
- (4) The Battalion Medical representative at Medical Battalion will be designated by the Battalion Medical Officer. He will be responsible for informing the Battalion S-1 of all 1st Antitank Battalion casualties received at 1st Medical Battalion.
- (5) The Battalion S-1 will be responsible to insure that all casualties are reported to the Division CCRC as soon as information is relayed from the Battalion Medical representative at 1st Medical Battalion. In addition, the Battalion S-1 will insure that the required combat casualty forms are submitted by the Unit Commander at least 10 hours after the casualty has occurred.
- (6) When discussing or reporting casualties the following casualty reporting codes will be utilized:

(a) Battle casualty evacuated.

(b) Killed in action.

(c) Dead of wounds.

(d) Non-Battle, evacuated.

j. Miscellaneous.

(1) No leaves other than emergency leave will be granted.

(2) Decorations and Medals - Recommendations for decorations, medals and awards will be forwarded to this Headquarters within 5 days upon return to encampment.

5. COMMAND AND COMMUNICATIONS-ELECTRONICS.

a. See reference (d).

(1) Commanding Officer Company C will maintain the capability of monitoring the Battalion Command Net at all times.

(2) Air panels will be kept available to mark front line positions. VS-4/u (red panels) on odd days and VS-6/u (yellow panels) on even days.

1. SUMMARY OF THE ENEMY SITUATION.

- a. Composition. Recent intelligence reports indicate that enemy forces in the area of operations consist of both local force and main force units. Local forces are known to have NVN advisors. Main force units consist of both regular Viet Cong and NVA forces. Elements of the 1st VC Regiment are believed to be regrouping in the area following Operation HOT SPRINGS.
- b. Strength and disposition. See Appendix 1 (Enemy Disposition Overlay).
- c. Combat Efficiency. Status of training is reported to be good to excellent for main force units. However, the large number of crew served and individual weapons captured during Operation HOT SPRINGS indicated that absence of leaders seriously affects efficiency. Also there are indications that untrained replacements are being integrated into the structure.
- d. Arms and Armament. Latest information and captured weapons continue to indicate that the VC are armed with a cross-section of U.S., ChiCom, and Soviet Bloc small arms, automatic weapons, and ordnance. Local Force and Main Force units are known to possess a 60mm/81mm mortar and 57mm/75mm recoilless rifle support capability. Also a number of 12.7mm and modified .50 cal. machine guns are in their inventory. However, due to losses in Operation HOT SPRINGS the number of enemy major caliber weapons may be depleted in the area of operations.
- e. Reinforcements. The enemy could possibly be reinforced by the 18th NVA Regiment which is reported to be proceeding northward from Binh Dinh Province.

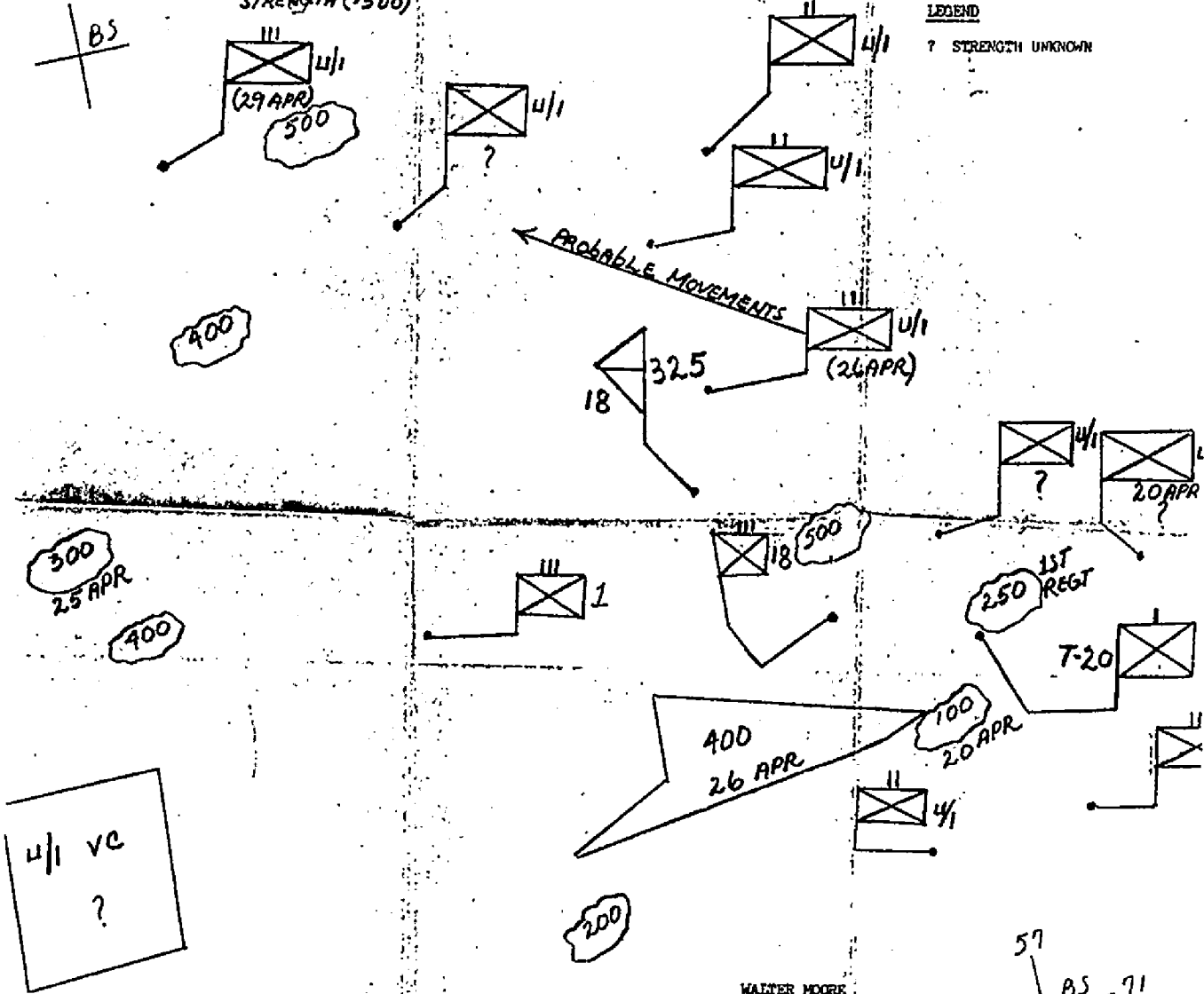

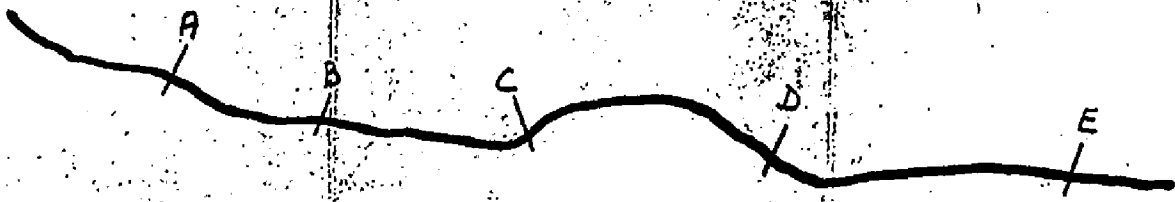

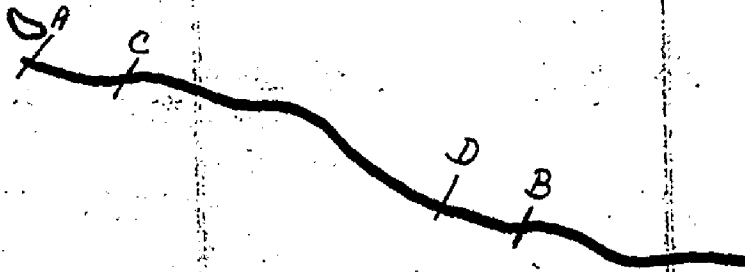

From point A to point B road varies from 8 feet to 14 feet wide. From point B east it is generally 14 feet or wider.

From point C to point D there are numerous (over 30) road cuts ranging from 3 feet to 6 feet wide across road. There are over 100 fox holes, tunnels, and cave entrances along road bank between C and D. Entire length of road on overlay can be traversed by Ontos with many detours around road cuts. Visibility in village areas very restricted and also maneuvering room highly restricted. Many likely areas for AT mines. Soil adjacent to road firm and dry.

Fields of fire and visibility to North and West of Hill 37 generally good—many small clumps of trees south of river however will just have to be maneuvered around and reconnoitered by unit commanders.

6. Supporting Forces

- a. Division AG units: A very detailed trafficability study was made of Ontec routes south and north of the Song Tra Khuc into the objective area (See enclosure (2)).
- b. Division Imagery Interpretation Units: An excellent mosaic as well as individual photos of bridges, bypasses and barriers were provided along both routes. All material is being maintained by the Battalion GOC for future reference.
- c. Det, Co C, 1st Engineer Battalion was included in this task organization to provide barrier destruction and to blow in the sides of tank traps for rapid penetration. In actuality, the Ontec column was not committed, so on 13 May 1966 the team blew in three of the more extensive tunnels in An My (2), BS 548742 for the ARVN forces.
- d. Det, Hq, 1st Antitank Battalion was provided to give added depth to the resupply, maintenance and liaison for the Ontec column during its thrust north of the river. Since the Ontec thrust did not materialize their presence was not exploited.

10. Execution.
- a. 2 May 1966. At 0700, Company C, 1st AF Bn was attached to 7th Marine Regiment for Operation MONTGOMERY.
- b. 4 May 1966. Received 7th Marine Regimental Frag Order 10-66 (Operation MONTGOMERY).

11. Results. Three covered bunkers and eight houses destroyed.



12. Administrative Matters

- a. Supplies. The Logistical Support Area was located at the Quang Ngai Airfield. No difficulties were experienced. Internally, the lack of operational trailers prevented the platoons and company headquarters from carrying additional ammunition to resupply the Ontos without immediate LSA support.
  - b. Maintenance. The Ontos company is capable of limited self-support through 2nd echelon in ordnance, motor transport and Ontos repair. Communication repair was provided by the LSA. No difficulties were experienced. Communications repair support was most efficient and satisfactory.
  - c. Treatment of casualties. No difficulties experienced.
  - d. Transportation. Assistance was provided by the AT Battalion Headquarters. However, the battalion headquarters does not have the assets to provide the needed replacements for the deadlined trailers and 3/4 ton trucks organic to this company. The 100% deadline in this equipment is a result of non-availability of repair parts.
  - e. Communications. This continues to be a major problem. Present communications equipment requires concentrated alignment and power out-put work. Radios work when in the immediate area for a communication check but difficulties have been encountered at even short ranges. The Battalion Communications Officer has been apprised of this matter and he has planned a follow-up test of each vehicle with bench testing.
  - f. Medical Evaluation. No comments.
13. Special Equipment and Techniques. No comments.
14. Commanders Comments. Based on the planning for MONTGOMERY, the 1st Assault Battalion activated a command and logistic group to provide additional support for Company C. In addition, Company A provided 2 platoons to reinforce Company C in order to insure accomplishment of the diverse missions. Reconnaissance and photo coverage of the objective area, with particular emphasis on roads and terrain trafficability, was extensive. The preparation for MONTGOMERY included S-2 and S-9 briefings which included individual crewmen and support personnel. In spite of these preparations, the decision to employ the Ontos/Infantry column on D plus 1 was not made. The attitude of all members of this Battalion was one of discouragement, and while they continue to plan for future operations with the same degree of professionalism as was displayed for MONTGOMERY, such setbacks as were experienced will certainly color their thinking. It is hoped that planned employment of the Ontos will indeed become a reality based on the preparation and abilities of this Battalion.

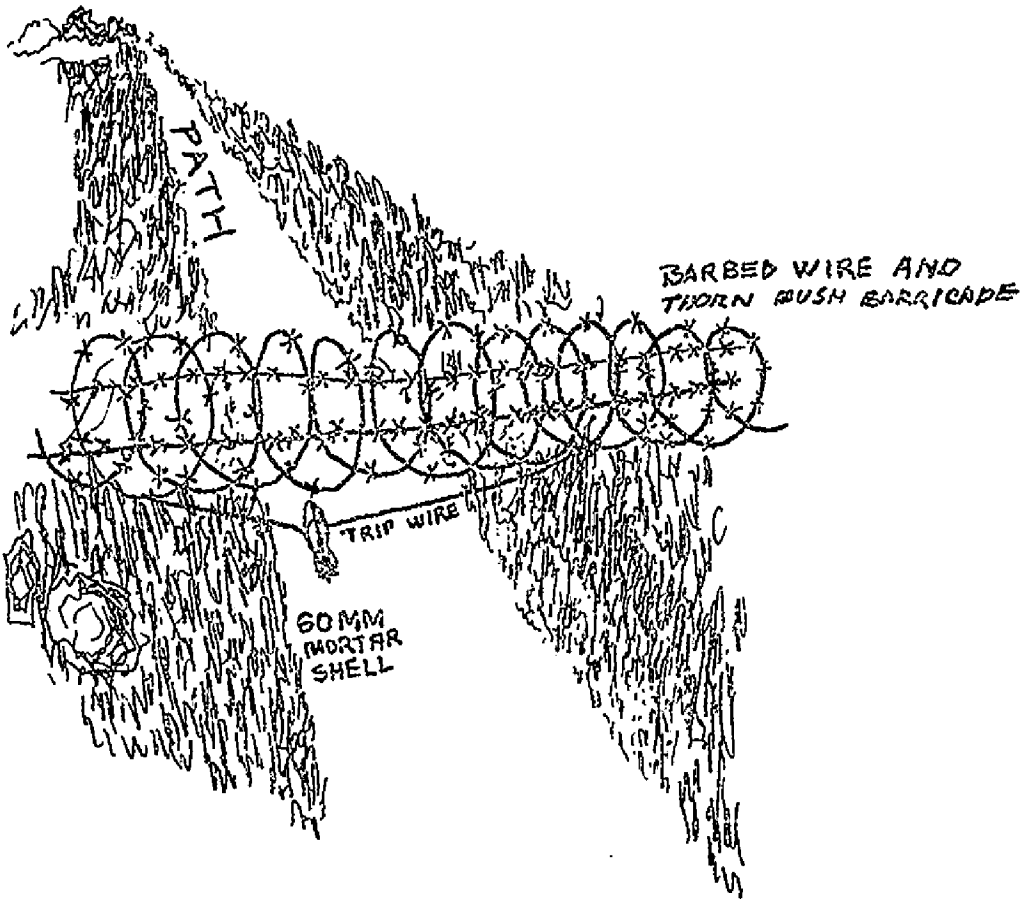
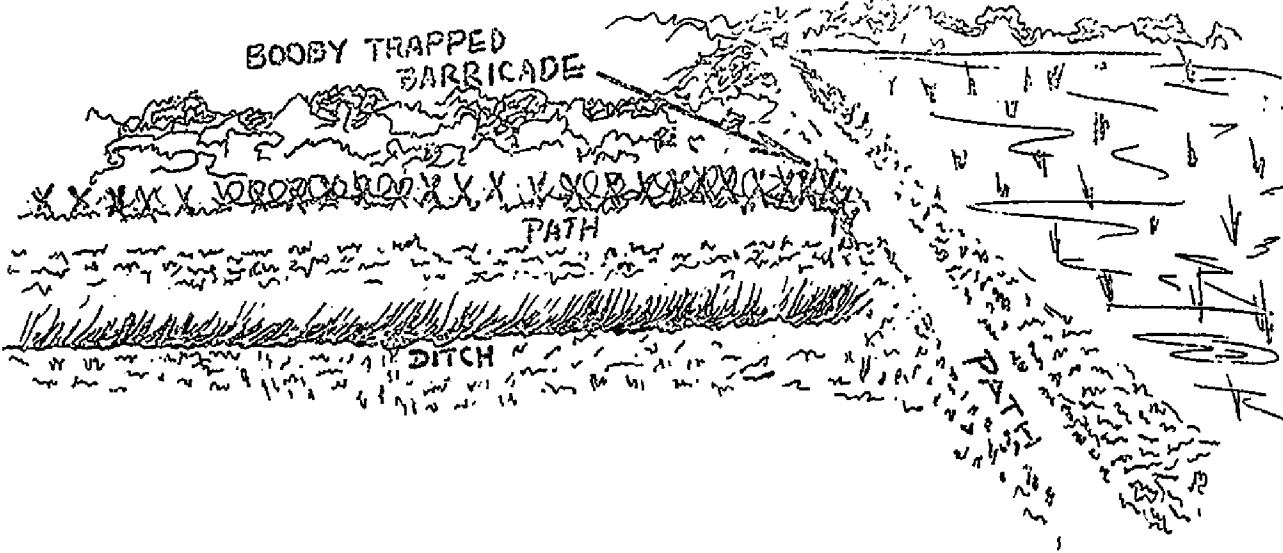

The Company C Headquarters and 7th Marine Regimental command post joined the convoy and returned to the Chu Lai combat base to assume a two hour stand-by status until the completion of the operation.
- d. D plus two 27 May 1966. No change. CO, Co C flew with Colonel HANNAY, Command Officer, 7th Marine Regiment, on a reconnaissance of the operational area. The flight verified that the area is trafficable for Ontos. However, 1/7 did not desire the platoon on stand-by.
- e. D plus three 28 May 1966. No change.
- f. D plus four 29 May 1966.
- (1) The heavy section of Ontos attached to the 7th Marines forward command post departed the Binh Son area at 1545 escorting the convoy back to the combat base. The heavy section was released at 1600.

(2) 1630. Operation MOBILE terminated.

11. Administrative Matters.

- a. Supplies. No difficulties experienced.
- b. Maintenance. No difficulties experienced.
- c. Treatment of Casualties. No difficulties experienced.
- d. Transportation. No difficulties experienced.
- e. Communication. No significant difficulties experienced; communication to infantry AM/PAC-25's with AM/PAC-10 was adequate.
- f. Medical Evaluation. No comment

12. Results. None.

13. Special Equipment and Techniques. No comments.

14. Commander's Comment. The inclusion of a reconnaissance team from this battalion with 1/7 significantly increased our knowledge of trafficability and fields of fire in that battalion's sector of the Regimental TACR. Greater benefits would have accrued had Ontos been permitted to operate in the sector.

15. Recommendations. Utilize Ontos for reconnaissance-in-force missions. Continue to utilize reconnaissance teams from this Battalion when operating in new sectors of responsibility.

1. The following report is based on a reconnaissance conducted during the period 25-28 May 1966. The 1st AT Bn (-) Recon Team was part of the 1st Battalion, 7th Marine Command Group for Operation MOBILE, a four day search and destroy operation. The operation also had as a concurrent objective the reconnaissance and establishing of company combat bases in the Battalion TAOR.
2. The Recon Team established a bivouac on Hill 40 (BS 664985) with the 1/7 Command Group. This position has now been permanently established as the DELTA Combat Base.
3. The following areas were visited by the Recon Team.
  - a. ALFA Combat Base (BT 623004)
  - b. BRAVO Combat Base (BS 700975)
  - c. Tentative 1/7 Command Post (BT 645004)
4. The Recon Team returned from Operation MOBILE with the Command Group. A tactical foot march was conducted from BS 661983 to BT 619013.
5. The results of the reconnaissance are contained in enclosure (1). Unless otherwise stated, all comments are the results of personal observation by members of the reconnaissance team.

## RECONNAISSANCE REPORT

1. General. The area of interest has diverse characteristics. Trafficability is fair to poor throughout. Most of the key terrain is terraced to the extent that engineer support would be required for the Ontos to move freely. The main road through the area runs south from the river at BT 619013. It has been graded as far as the Hill 40 complex. It is generally good although there are several soft spots in the Tan Hy area. Excellent firing positions are afforded by the key terrain features. Most of the rice paddies will be traversable if no significant rainfall is received during the summer months. The present rainy period has had an adverse effect on cross-country Ontos movement. However drainage is good in the area and it is to be expected that trafficability will improve rapidly.

### 2. ALFA Combat Base (BT 623004).

The major limitation to Ontos employment in the area is poor fields of fire and restriction to movement. Both sides of the road as far south as BT 627006 are lined with trees, brush and dwellings. Observation is severely restricted in this area. The hills are very difficult to ascend even on foot and are covered with dense brush and boulders.

### 3. BRAVO Combat Base (BS 700975)

This combat base is located on dominant terrain. The access road runs from BS 665978 and is believed to be fair for Ontos movement. It was not thoroughly reconned. 1/7 plans to improve it in the near future.

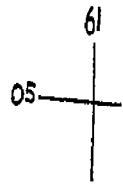
Firing positions on this hill offer excellent observation and fields of fire, especially to the southwest. With engineer support, trafficability will be fair to the southwest. Poor trafficability conditions exist to the west and northwest due to terracing and erosion. If maintenance and resupply problems can be overcome, it is felt that Ontos can be profitably employed in this area.

### 4. DELTA Combat Base. (BS 664985)

This is the prime Ontos area in the 1/7 TAOR. The Hill 40 complex offers excellent firing positions for Ontos, especially on the eastern slope. Observation and fields of fire are also excellent. During the dry season cross-country trafficability will be good throughout the area east of the road. West of the road condition for Ontos movement are poor because of terrain, brush and difficult slopes. A road is presently being graded up Hill 40.

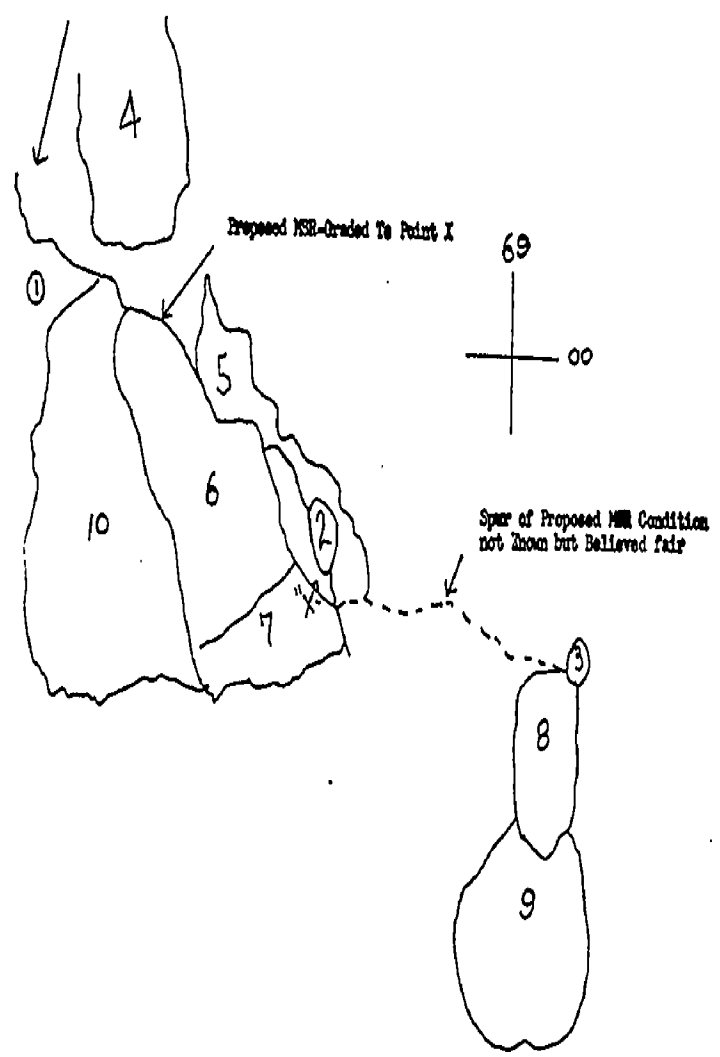
### 5. Tentative Battalion Command Post (BT 645004)

This is also dominant terrain and Ontos can be employed well here. Observation, fields of fire and avenues of approach are considered good to excellent. Trafficability in the area is contingent upon the amount of precipitation received. A significant amount of rainfall will restrict the Ontos to the road as is the case throughout the entire TAOR.
