PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. The 3d Battalion, 7th Marines continued to conduct patrolling throughout the assigned TAOR for the subject period. Company K took part in Operation ALLEN BROOK from the 7th to the 15th of May. The 3d Battalion, 7th Marines Command Group also participated in Operation ALLEN BROOK along with I 3/27, A 1/7 and G 2/7 from 15 to 18 May. Their contact with an estimated NVA battalion resulted in 162 NVA killed and numerous weapons captured.
2. Enemy initiated incidents within the 3d Battalion, 7th Marines TAOR increased during the month of May. Hill 37 received 82mm mortar fire almost daily during a period from 5 May to 22 May. Company I executed a successful ambush on 25 May, killing 10 NVA. The enemy continued to attempt to interdict friendly LOGPs with mines, booby traps, sniping, and ambushes. Mining incidents increased on Route #14 between Hill 55 and Hill 37. On 30 May a convoy was ambushed between CAF 2-2-4 and Hill 52. A platoon from Company I reacted to the ambush, killing 19 NVA and capturing several weapons.
3. OpCon of Company B was passed to 7th Marines on 18 May to participate in Operation MAMELUKE THRUST. Company I took over the additional responsibility of Hill 65 and Sea Bee Bridge. Company K was deployed to An Hoa and Company M assumed responsibility for Liberty Bridge.
4. Reconnaissance inserts continued to have significant sightings of enemy in the Arizona area. Platoon size enemy units were seen massing on several occasions, both north and south of the Song Vu Gia in the vicinity of the AT8454 grid. Recon called fire missions throughout the month resulting in 299 enemy killed.

(b) The southern end of Liberty Bridge, a fuel dump and a 105mm ammo dump were destroyed by fire.

(c) Two bridges along Route #5 were blown. Both are being reconstructed.

(d) Eleven jeeps received minor damage when an enemy mortar round hit near the Motor Pool.

(e) Two typewriters were destroyed when an enemy mortar round hit the S-1 office.

(f) Two 6x6 trucks were involved in accidents. Both have been replaced.

(2) Supply. No significant problems have been encountered during subject period.

(3) Motor Transport. The battalion received 20 new M151 jeeps to replace the M122 1/2 ton trucks.

(4) Inspection. The Command Motor Pool inspection was conducted on the 29th of May. The battalion received a satisfactory with minor discrepancies.

a. Mission Assigned. Occupy and defend assigned Tactical Area of Responsibility (TAOR); conduct unilateral offensive operations and aggressive day/night patrolling and ambushing throughout the TAOR and with approval, in the RZ; maintain maximum surveillance and interdiction of waterway access/egress routes into TAOR and of possible rocket sites located therein; prepare to conduct combined and coordinated operations with GVN forces within and beyond TAOR; provide alert forces and convoy escorts from squad to company size, as a reserve/alert force for operations anywhere in RVN; launch counterattacks against enemy penetrations in TAOR; conduct concentrated and sustained Civic Action and Psychological Warfare program in Revolutionary Development; coordinate with GVN officials to organize, train, advise and, as necessary, initially provide combat skilled leadership to the Popular Forces in the form of Combined Action Units; maintain security of vital lines of communications in coordination with GVN forces within TAOR.

- (b) Bunkers are being improved near working spaces and a project is underway to provide protection from mortar fragments in working and living spaces.
- (c) A drainage system is being rebuilt around Hill 37.
- (d) Four (4) requests for tractor trucks were submitted, 3 were filled.
- (e) Three (3) field heads were received from Seabees.

(m) Tam My (h), 2 truck loads of lumber to rebuild houses.

(n) Tam My (h), 50 sheets of tin for the people.

(2) Serious Incidents. Four Serious Incident Reports were filed this month. Of these, solatium was paid to one of the victims, one victim cannot be found, and two will be paid shortly. The total amount of solatium paid was \$2,000 VN.

(3) MedCaps. MedCaps have decreased this month due to enemy activity in this area. For the month of May the number of Vietnamese treated in the battalion CAAOR was 1547. This total includes the sub-unit of An Hoa which contributed highly to the total of MedCaps.

(4) Projects. There are a total of seven projects underway at this time: A well is being constructed in Dai Loc & Market Place is under construction in Tam Hoa (h); a school house is also being constructed in Tam Hoa (h); a school house is being constructed at Phu Da (3); a pipeline is being put in at the An Hoa Complex; Construction on the German Hospital at the An Hoa Complex is half completed and continuing; a vegetable garden is being planted at Phu Da (2). These projects have also been hindered by the rise in enemy activity in this area.

f. Administration. There is a shortage in certain MOS fields.

g. Personnel. The battalion category of readiness is C-2 for personnel. Total strength is 30 Marine Officers, 109 Marine Enlisted, 3 Navy Officers, 55 Navy Enlisted.

h. Formal Training

(1) Orientation. All newly arrived personnel received intensive orientation and indoctrination, which included instruction in care, maintenance, safe handling, familiarization and firing of the M-16 rifle.

i. Communications

(1) During the month of May radio communications were satisfactory with interference decreasing to a lower percentage than previous reports.

(2) The increasing amount of mortar attacks on the Battalion Command Post caused considerable damage to wire lines which disrupted teletype and telephone circuits for periods of 4 to 6 hours.

(3) During the month all trunk lines and teletype lines were cabled and buried. Further projects involve burying all wire lines to avoid snags and damage.

j. Weather

(1) General. Weather conditions during the month of May did not hinder logistical support. The high temperatures during the month caused numerous heat casualties and in some cases made troop movement difficult. Thunder showers have occurred late in the day during the month and have helped to maintain the water level relatively constant.

k. Intelligence

(1) Enemy Situation, 1-31 May. Reconnaissance elements had numerous sightings of enemy movement north and south of the Song Vu Gia in the vicinity of grid AT8454. Intelligence gained from Marine operations in the area reveal newly infiltrated NVA units. The 36th Regiment, 308th NVA Division has been confirmed as being located in the Go Noi Island area, vicinity of grid AT9754. The 162d Battalion, 330th Regiment, 333d NVA Division, has been reported in the Thuong Duc area, vicinity of grid EM756, through interrogation reports. The 31st Regiment 341st Division has been confirmed as being in the Thuong Duc area. No recent reports have been received on the Q-14 (LF) Company which was last reported in Loc Tan village (AT8454).

(2) It appears that the enemy had positioned his forces during previous months for possible attacks to take place during the month of May. Several reports were received during this month of coordinated

attacks between Dai Loc (AT9157) and the Thuong Duc Special Forces Camp (ZC1554). Marine operations, however, appear to have kept the enemy forces occupied. Local guerrillas continue to operate within the TAOR, utilizing their tactics to interdict LOC's while Marine operations engage large NVA forces.

(5) Terrain. The terrain of 3d Battalion, 7th Marines TAOR is primarily flat, laced with open rice paddies throughout the eastern, central and southern sectors. The northern and southern flanks of the TAOR are mountainous with heavy secondary vegetation and steep foothills. The two main rivers which flow through the central and southern sectors of the TAOR are the Song Vu Gia and the Song Thu Bon respectively. The principal terrain features of the TAOR are hills 55, 37 and 65.

m. Medical

- (1) General. The overall health of the Marines within the battalion continues to be excellent with no major outbreak of illness.
- (2) Evacuations. Casualty evacuations continue to be satisfactory.
- (3) Supply. Medical supplies are adequate. Transportation for supply runs has been adequate.
- (4) An inspection of health records and immunization procedures by the Regimental Surgeon this month was satisfactory.

n. Chaplain

- (1) The Chaplain was absent from the battalion for 10 days: 7 days R&R; 3 days hospitalization at 1st Hospital Company.
- (2) Eighteen Sunday Masses were conducted in 3/7 and throughout the 7th Marine Regiment. Attendance at these services was 357. Fourteen Weekday Masses were also conducted throughout the various units in the battalion with 155 attending.
- (3) Four Memorial Services were conducted.
- (4) Twelve Last Rites were administered, the majority while the Chaplain was a patient at 1st Hospital Company.
- (5) Three lectures were given on the Religions and Customs of Vietnam with 85 attending.

p. Psychological Operations. This month's PsyWar operations have produced satisfactory results. The reward program proved to be especially successful as numerous and varying types of ordnance, ranging in caliber from 155mm to 81mm and hand grenades, were turned into this command. In an effort to exploit these successes 102 air sorties, releasing leaflets pertaining to the reward and Chieu Hoi programs, were requested throughout this TACR. In addition to the leaflet drops the companies of this battalion hand distributed 2,300 reward leaflets and 1,100 Chieu Hoi leaflets. The MedCap Teams distributed 3,800 sanitation leaflets. On 13 May an AV Team was employed in conjunction with the presentation of six General Walt Scholarships. During the ceremony, which featured six of the AV Team's Films, 1,000 Chieu Hoi Balls and 1,152 Chieu Hoi Pens were distributed. On 7 May a FOET Team was employed to exploit an enemy grenade throwing incident.

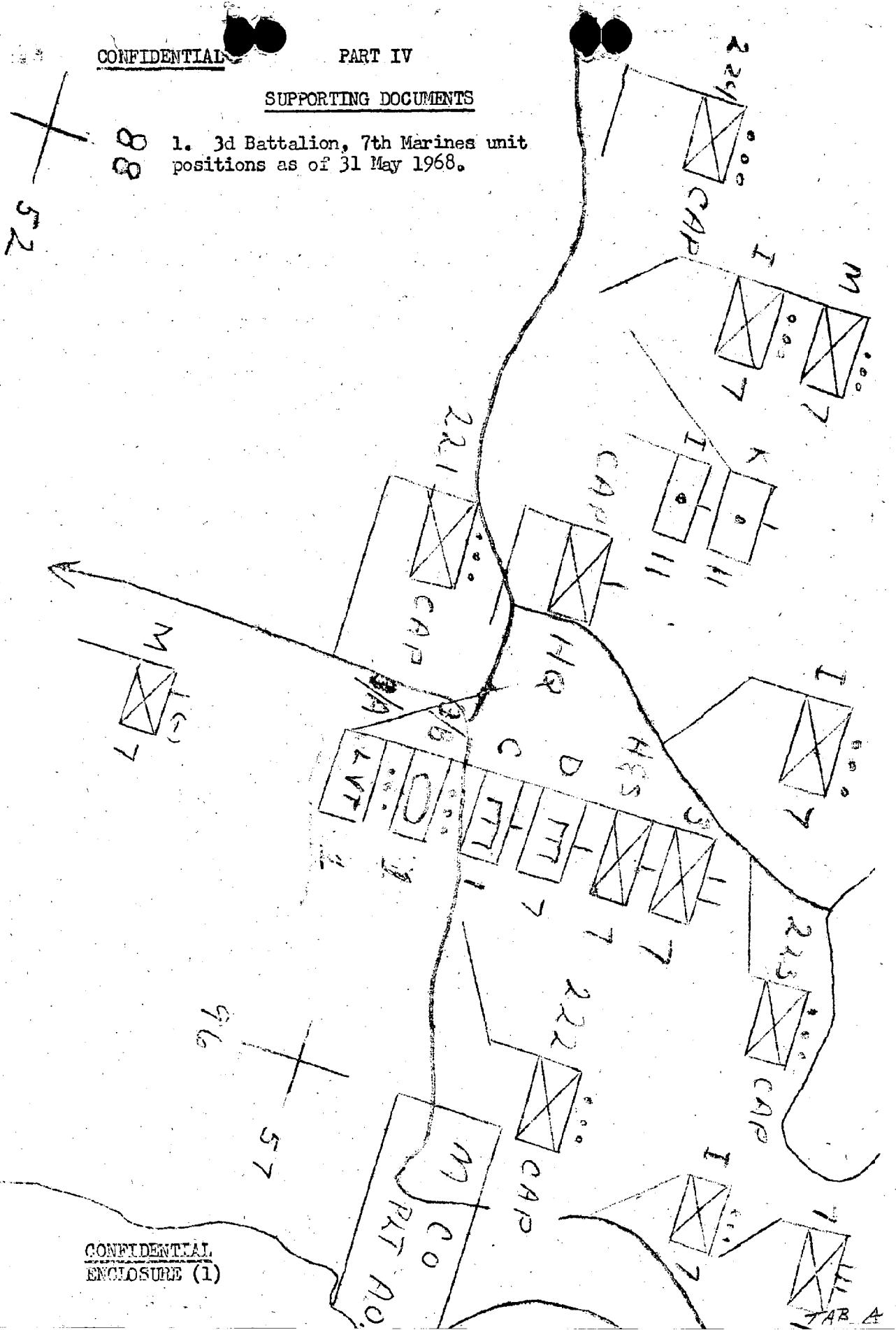

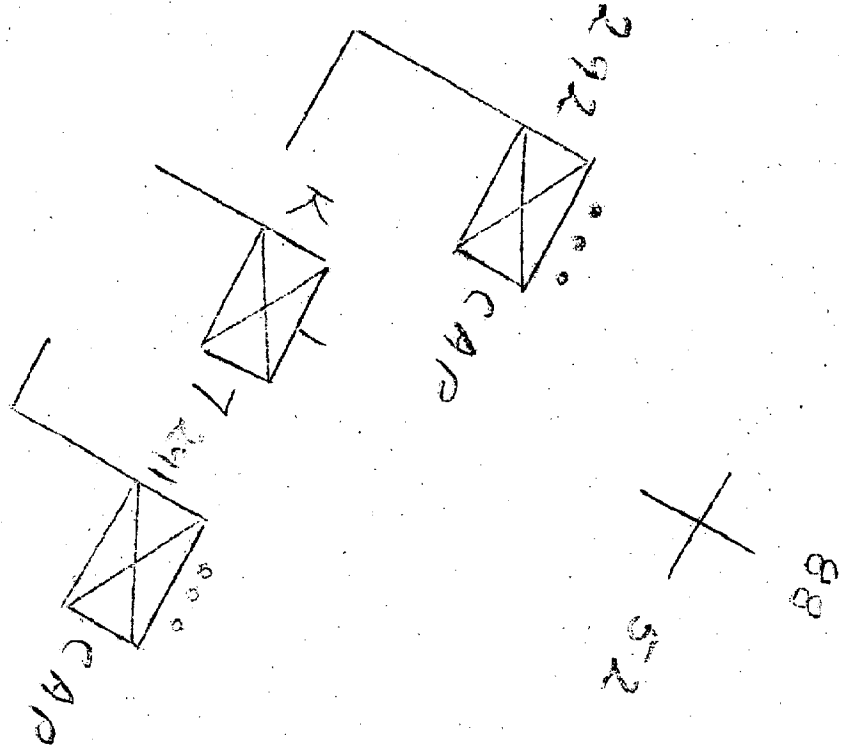
